I. Catalog Description:

This course is a study of cross-cultural comparisons of management and communications processes. The emphasis is on cultural geographic distinctions and antecedents that affect individual, group, and organizational behavior. Topics may include sociocultural demographics, economics, technology, political/legal environment of cluster countries and their relationship to organizational communication and decision-making..

IV. Method of Instruction:

Instruction may consist: Lecture, Video/Power Point Presentations, Periodical and Internet Research, Written Reports, Role Playing

V. Course Content:

In this course students will study cross-cultural comparisons of management and communication processes. Cultural geographic distinctions, economic, technology, political-legal issues, negotiations, and decision-making processes in the international cultural environment will also be addressed.

VI. Learning Outcomes:

Learning Outcome 1: The student will be able to utilize a broad array of cross-cultural knowledge necessary for supervision of multicultural personnel in the United States or abroad

Performance Objectives/Methods of Measurement for this Outcome.

The student will be able to:

1. Determine through written examination the influence of national

culture on the development and transfer of HRM practices, selection, socialization, training, performance appraisal, compensation, and career development.

2. Demonstrate knowledge of different cultural norms by writing a cultural manual suitable for someone who will be working in a different country with a different culture.
3. Prepare and present a Power Point presentation of their cultural manual to the entire class.

Learning Outcome 2: The student will be able to interpret cross-cultural communications cues through role playing and other problem solving situations.

Performance Objectives/Methods of Measurement for this Outcome.

The student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate through role playing the skills and competencies necessary to manage in a diverse environment.
2. Demonstrate through role playing the skills necessary to communicate with a different culture, both verbally and non-verbally.
3. Solve an ethical dilemma using cultural and political guidelines from another country.

SCANS

The following SCANS Skills will be taught in this course: Competencies include: acquires and evaluates information (C5), organizes and maintains information (C6), interprets and communicates information (C7), participates as a member of a team (C9), works with cultural diversity (C14), and understands systems (C15). Foundation skills included are: reading (F1), writing (F2), listening (F5), speaking (F6), creative thinking (F7), decision making (F8), problem-solving (F9), seeing things in the mind's eye (F10), knowing how to learn (F11), reasoning (F12), responsibility (F13), self-esteem (F14), sociability (F15), self-management (F16), and integrity/honesty (F17).

VII: Course requirements and grade computation:

A. College Requirements:

1. A written comprehensive final examination, not to exceed three hours in length, shall be given at the end of each semester for each course at the regularly scheduled time. Any exceptions to these requirements must be approved by the appropriate dean. Other examinations are given at the discretion of the instructor.

A student who must be absent from a final examination should petition that instructor for permission to post pone the examination. A student absent without permission from a final examination is graded “F”. Postponed examination result in a grade of “I”.
