- I. Catalog Description: (Spring semester offering only) This second semester course continues to emphasize listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills within culturally significant contexts. Students study the dative and the genitive cases, dative and genitive prepositions, nouns with "der-" and "ein-" words, imperatives, modals, subordinate clauses, the future and past tenses, and adjective endings. Students study vocabulary dealing with mass media, movies, and cultural performances. They learn to relate biographical and autobiographical facts. They are introduced to German foods, restaurants, and eating habits. A language laboratory is required.
- II. Pre-requisites, co-requisites and other requirements: GERM 1411 or equivalent, or departmental approval.
- III. Text: Text: Moeller/Deutsch Heute Hm (Textbook And Quia Passcard)
- IV. Instruction will consist of:

Lecture re: grammatical structure, reading, writing, oral presentations, and listening comprehension activities.
- V. Course Content: German 1412 is a continuation of the elementary course of German 1411. It is the second semester course for students who have had no formal instruction in the language. It is designed to introduce students to the fundamentals of the German language and to give them an opportunity to practice listening, speaking reading and writing German.
- VI. Learning Outcomes and Performance Objectives with their method of measurement as used to determine the students' mastery of those outcomes.

Performance objectives

By the end of the semester,

- students will be able to understand most spoken *German* at a slow or normal pace.
- students will develop skills and strategies for listening comprehension of authentic language samples.
- students will be able to participate in an everyday conversation on a range of topics.
- students will be able to narrate and describe present and past events with certain grammatical accuracy.
- students will be able to use *German* in eliciting and providing information.
- students will be able to read simple texts in *German* and will develop skills in reading simple authentic texts.
- students will write simple sentences and paragraphs on topics related to everyday experiences.
- students will be able to identify elements of the *German* culture.

Method of Measurement

There will be four major exams during the course of the semester and a comprehensive, departmental final exam. The final course grade will be determined based on the grade distribution decided by each instructor. Example grade distribution: Major exams-50%, Quizzes-15% Homework assignments 10%, Departmental Final exam 25%.

A minimum of 15 hours of language lab is required during the term. Students will fulfill the lab requirement by completing the assignments in the workbook and lab manual.

VII. Course requirements and grade computation.

A. College Requirements:

A written, comprehensive final examination, not to exceed two and one-half hours in length, shall be given at the end of each semester for each course at the regularly scheduled time. Any exceptions to these requirements must be approved by the appropriate dean. Other examinations are given at the discretion of the instructor.

A student who must be absent from a final examination should petition that instructor for permission to postpone the examination. **A student absent without permission from a final examination is graded "F."** Postponed examinations result in a grade of "I." The final exam must be taken within 120 calendar days from the end of the semester or the grade automatically becomes an "F." (San Antonio College Bulletin, Faculty Handbook - January 1995)

B. Departmental Requirement:

Homework: The instructor will assign written homework at the end of each class. If students are unable to attend a class, they still are responsible for completing the assignment and submitting it on the date that it is due.

Punctual Attendance/Participation: It is very important for students come to class on time every day, ask and answer questions, participate in all class activities and encourage everyone else to participate.

Excessive Absences: A student absent the equivalent of two weeks of instruction may be dropped from the class by the instructor with a grade of W. Also, a student may be allowed

to make up the work only with the instructor's approval. Regardless of circumstances, the student will be held responsible for completion of all course requirements.

Cell Phones: Students must turn off all pagers and cell phones before entering classrooms and computer labs.

Foreign Language students are expected adhere to the individual instructors' syllabus and college regulations.
