- I. Catalog Description: SPAN 1300 is for the beginning student whose main goal is to learn to communicate orally in Spanish. Although there is some reading and writing, the emphasis is on developing speaking and listening comprehension skills. Sections will be identified in the class schedule for workforce specialties. Students wanting additional practice in developing reading and writing skills may take this course concurrently with SPAN 1411. A language laboratory is available.
- II. Pre-requisites, co-requisites and other requirements: NONE
- III. Text: Cuéntame, De Leon,.
- IV. Instruction will consist of:
- Lecture, oral communication activities, presentations, listening, reading, writing, group work.
- V. Course Content: This course focuses on the following content areas: greetings, personal information, description of family, time and dates, body parts and health, clothing and weather. The goal of this course is to give students the opportunity to practice oral communication skills. The emphasis is on involvement. A combination of lecture, in-class communication activities and presentations will help students to develop communication skills.
- VI. Learning Outcomes and Performance Objectives with their method of measurement as used to determine the students' mastery of those outcomes.

The student should reach the Novice-mid level on the ACTFL (American Council on Teaching Foreign Languages) scale in comprehension and speaking by the end of this course. For the description of the Novice-Mid Level consult the ACTFL web site.*

This course emphasizes speaking and listening skills that is the ability to understand spoken Spanish.
At the end of the course

- students will demonstrate understanding of some Spanish culture.

- students will be engaged in a conversation, provide and obtain information.
- students will be able to understand simple conversations in Spanish
- students will be able to introduce themselves and talk about themselves
- students will be able to read and write simple sentences and basic texts

Method of measurement

There will be four major examinations during the course of the semester, and a comprehensive Departmental final examination. Instructors may determine the final grade based on written and oral tests and quizzes, homework, presentations, and class participation.

The final course grade mix will be determined based on the grade distribution decided by each individual instructor. Example grade distribution: Major exams-50%, Quizzes- 15%, Homework assignments 10%, departmental final exam 25%.

VII. Course requirements and grade computation.

A. College Requirements:

A written, comprehensive final examination, not to exceed two and one-half hours in length, shall be given at the end of each semester for each course at the regularly scheduled time. Any exceptions to these requirements must be approved by the appropriate dean. Other examinations are given at the discretion of the instructor.

A student who must be absent from a final examination should petition that instructor for permission to postpone the examination. **A student absent without permission from a final examination is graded "F."** Postponed examinations result in a grade of "I." The final exam must be taken within 120 calendar days from the end of the semester or the grade automatically becomes an "F." (San Antonio College Bulletin, Faculty Handbook - January 1995)

B. Departmental Requirement:

Homework: The instructor will assign written homework at the end of each class. If students are unable to attend a class, they still are responsible for completing the assignment and submitting it on the date that it is due.

Punctual Attendance/Participation: It is very important for students come to class on time every day, ask and answer questions, participate in all class activities and encourage everyone else to participate.

Excessive Absences: A student absent the equivalent of two weeks of instruction may be dropped from the class by the instructor with a grade of W. Also, a student may be allowed to make up the work only with the instructor's approval. Regardless of circumstances, the student will be held responsible for completion of all course requirements.

Cell Phones: Students must turn off all pagers and cell phones before entering classrooms and computer labs.

Foreign Language students are expected adhere to the individual instructors' syllabus and college regulations.
